KINSELLA: Listen, what we try and do, and which we have done for multiple times as well, we try and look at the overall suburb. Then we look at what infrastructure is needed for the overall suburb.

5 KINSELLA: If you look at Wentworth Point for instance, we got the bridge up and running, that cost us about sixty seventy million which we had to develop.
 That's that connection bridge between the two –

KINSELLA:Connection between Rhodes and Wentworth Point.:Wentworth Point, yep.

10 KINSELLA: So, what we looked at, how can we improve Wentworth Point and make it more transit orientated, make it more public transport orientated because you had a railway station over in Rhodes, you had a peninsular over here and very difficult to get out of it, you had to get on the roundabout on Homebush Bay Drive, which was a difficult process to try and go through that. So, what we, and mind you, it took us about seven years to get through all of that, agencies, like what, twenty government agencies to try and, it took us a year and a half to build it, it took seven years to get approvals. So, the approval process was almost as costly and much more cumbersome than actual construction (unintelligible).

Yep.

20 KINSELLA: So then, beyond that we built the community centre and library, again handle it through government, so we built a shopping centre even though it's a fairly big loss-making entity at the moment, but long term it works for the community as the idea is to keep people within the suburb as against everyone jumping in the car and leaving the suburb.

: Right.

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KINSELLA: Which creates traffic chaos and whatever.

: So, focusing on East Rhodes.

KINSELLA: East Rhodes, then what we looked at, we looked at in the same vein, which said okay, the biggest constraint in East Rhodes, again, was traffic, RMS put a limit on the amount of apartments that are there, even with that limit it was conditional upon infrastructure.

Right.


KINSELLA: And the infrastructure, having looked at the train station, needed upgrading because the train station has about a ten-minute evacuation, which the best standards is probably about three to four minutes. So in other words, if something happened it would take that long to get that amount of people off it.

		things needed a school for instance, you've got, whatever, fifteen thousand people

		do is say, okay, can we plan it holistically, and then planning holistically we

KINSELLA: First of all, there was talk about being made a priority precinct. I'm not sure what year it was made priority precinct, like in development you have to be a long time ahead in terms of getting sites. It takes years to get development approvals and I think Rhodes East has proven that. It's had three fails attempts by government to bring out the planning on it.

Yep.

KINSELLA: And it still isn't in a place where it's even close to being buyable, so I think there will have to be another attempt made to try and get it working. So, I'm not sure why government is looking at it different than other precincts. If you look at, say, Melrose Park, it would have a density of, say, two point five and some of it 3.5 to 1.

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So is it something that you or your company look at an area and go there is potential here.

KINSELLA: Yep.

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This is where we need to develop.

- KINSELLA:We generally do bigger developments, we sometimes buy single sites but rarely.:Right.
- KINSELLA: So, we like to go into an area, leave a mark in it and in terms of putting in infrastructure, putting in shopping and putting in all the conveniences to make it a good area. As I said, we have been in Rhodes for whatever twelve thirteen years or more, and we like to go into an area and work on it and improve and get infrastructure and stick with so it's long term in the sense it does make you do things better, because when you do a development in a certain area it has to look good, because you're still there, and you're there and you're there. And you try and hold the prices up for your investors.

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Okay.

KINSELLA: Like, in the old days it was more investors. 70 percent, 30 percent or not, whereas now it's turned the other way around.



So, when you started your or became interested in East Rhodes and purchased your first property, was Prolet around at that stage?

KINSELLA: Yeah, they would have been there before us.

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Can you recall when you first met any of the Jacobs brothers?

KINSELLA: It was a good while ago, I would say it would have beeen sometime around the time that we bought our first sites, sometime around then.



And do you recall when that first meeting took place? Was there an introduction by somebody or was it, can you explain to me how that all developed?

- KINSELLA: I don't know exactly. I can't figure out exactly when it happened, but he was introduced to us by one or two people. It was either, I suspect, by Joseph Chidiac or Andrew Ferguson. I'm not sure which one would've introduced, but it would have been one of those two.
- 5 Alright, and had you known of Joseph Chidiac at that time to have that introduction?
 - KINSELLA: I think most of those introductions happened kind of at the same time. Because in order to get that land together and, like, there is so many lots in here, if you look at the amount of house lots that's there you have to pick up.

: Right.

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- KINSELLA: It's a hell of a task, with so many different people, owners, because you've got some old ladies, you've got some Arabics, some Chinese, you've got some, like, it's so varied and everyone has a different need and want and ambition. And value.
- 15 So, trying to put some timeframe around when, I know you said your first purchase in East Rhodes was five or six years ago.

KINSELLA: It could even be seven, it's somewhere...

: In that ballpark.

KINSELLA: In that ballpark, yep.

: You know

You know you believe that an introduction took place either facilitated by either Andrew Ferguson or Joseph Chidiac.

KINSELLA: Yep.

- : Do you recall when you first met Joseph Chidiac?
- KINSELLA: It would have been some time around that time as well.

: Around about that time?

KINSELLA: From memory, sometime around that time.

: And do you know how you met this fellow Joseph Chidiac or how that occurred?

KINSELLA: Don't hold me to this but I would say it was through Andrew Ferguson.

: Okay.

KINSELLA: Now I'm not a hundred percent sure of that.

Right.

KINSELLA: But I've got a feeling, that could be right or wrong.

: Right.

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KINSELLA: But I've got a feeling it's...

- : Alright, let's talk about Andrew Ferguson and Joseph Chidiac just for a moment. Do you understand do you have any knowledge Joseph Chidiac's job was back then. What his role was, what he did?
- KINSELLA: I've been told he has several, that he has coffee shops or restaurants or whatever. That he also helps (unintelligible) the family was into cars and real estate.The Chidiac family.
- KINSELLA: The Chidiac family.

Right.

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KINSELLA: So ah, like, he's got two of his nephews to help, one of them in particular is reported to be the best real estate agent, I think he won real estate agent of the year several years, I think with Ray White or whatever. The other one, John and Alex Chidiac, is in the area as well and he's got a business over at Wentworth Point, which they sell, rent or whatever. So, they are very close to the ground there, we didn't use them to pick up everything there. We used some of the other local agents, we bought some stuff at auction, we made some enquiries ourselves, we used another agent, I think from Knight Frank, so we used lots of different methodology because with sites, if you, there's all these sites, so if you can't pick up this one and you've got this one, this one is no use to you. And like, generally, the incentive generally to pick up sites is to offer them more money.

: So what...

KINSELLA: That's the name of the game.

At that time between five or seven years ago, do you have an understanding of Joseph Chidiac working in real estate himself or was it just his connections you were aware of?

25 KINSELLA: Probably the connections I would say. I think, probably, I can't a hundred percent remember, I know he was working in putting some stuff together with Prolet as well, so...

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So, you have an understanding that Joseph Chidiac had a relationship with the Jacobs brothers from Prolet at that time?

30 KINSELLA: And wish – when you go and do sites, you have to recognise the people that are in the area, and you have to try and not step on anybody toes because the (unintelligible), Prolet and me are fighting over the site. They already might own these two and what you want to do is, to a degree, work together because the reality is they're in the area or they're (unintelligible) than I was, and we are in the area. So, instead of fighting each other, driving each other crazy, and the other thing is when someone sees that Billbergia, Billbergia for right or wrong is seen

as the big guy in the area, right, even though we are not really that big, so they think Billbergia is chasing this land, it's worth four times as much as what it's worth.

- Right.
- 5 KINSELLA: Because they look across the road and see the twenty-five storey buildings Yep. :
 - KINSELLA: And they say, well listen, Billbergia is big, they can pay a lot more than they reall want, they're, chasing, so you try and get someone else to the deal.
 - So, you don't tend to lose money on the deal.
- 10 KINSELLA: In development there is always risk. Every time you get a recession, fifty to sixty percent of developments go down, so it's a risk game, it's risk reward, I mean that's the name of the game. But basic what you want is, instead of, like when people know Billbergia are in the game it's always more expensive.

Okay.

15 KINSELLA: Always. :

Always.

KINSELLA: So, then you try and get someone else to make a deal, and that could be a Chidiac, that could be Ray White, that could be Knight Frank, that could be whatever.

Right. :

- 20 KINSELLA: Like, generally the best way to buy everything, we buy at auction because that's the best way to get things.
 - Right, so you mentioned that Andrew Ferguson, you had some memory that potentially Andrew Ferguson might've introduced you to Joseph Chidiac?

KINSELLA: That's right, like, we know Andrew (unintelligible) from CFMEU.

So, let's focus on Andrew and your knowledge of him. :

KINSELLA: Yep

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Of him. When did you first meet Andrew? :

KINSELLA: Probably twenty-seven years ago as General Secretary of CFMEU, I think it was actually BWIU at the time before it became the CFMEU.

Alright.

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KINSELLA: Now is CFMEU or whatever now.

What did he do at the (sneeze) CFMEU?

KINSELLA: He was the top guy in Sydney.

- Right.
- 35 KINSELLA: He was in charge, he was in charge in Lidcombe.

Right.

	KINSELLA:	So he was the guy that stopped your sites and caused you every kind of hardship under the sun.
	:	So, he had a very important role to your business.
	KINSELLA:	Yeah, well the thing is, if he didn't, if he was unhappy with you, he can stop your
5		site as long as he likes. He'd come in on a safety issue and stop things.
	:	Okay, and can you recall the meeting? Can you recall the events where Andrew
		Ferguson suggested that you liaise with Joseph Chidiac?
	KINSELLA:	I'm not sure if he suggested that, I think it might've been a cup of coffee and an
		introduction.
10	:	So it was just an intro Do you know where the coffee took place?
	KINSELLA:	From memory I think that's what it was, more than likely some place near
		Rhodes.
	:	Right, and do you recall how you were informed to go to the meeting, did you
		understand what the meeting was for? Can you give me some details around that?

What's your best recollection?

KINSELLA: That's my best recollection, I'm not sure.

KINSELLA: Yep.

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Alright, do you have a recollection of that conversation of what Andrew Ferguson said to you about Joseph Chidiac or what Joseph Chidiac said to you about what could be achieved?

KINSELLA: Not really, it's like I had meetings last Saturday and I can't exactly remember what the bloke, the Lebanese bloke said to me about the development on Harrington Street, I can't remember exactly what he said at that meeting. So, something that might've happened whatever six seven years ago whatever, it was I can't remember. Obviously the vibes of the thing is that he's in the area, he knows the area well, and he might be able to help secure some of the sites. And you are interested in the area, he's got some connections in the area, perhaps you guys can work together, that's kind of what it would've meant anyway.
Cokay alright, when he said you have some interest in the area, what part of the precinct could Joseph Chidiac helped you with? Was it East Rhodes, was it the Station Precinct or was it the whole lot?

KINSELLA: It was more, I believe, in the Station Precinct because we had an agent from Knight Frank working on, down Leeds Street, so at the stage he was more in that particular area, and it's very fluid when you're trying to get sites, you get the deal almost done, all of a sudden something changes or changes their mind and it can take another five years to get back to the same place as what you were in.
Did you have some understanding or do you have some knowledge of who Joseph


KINSELLA: Not really, but I, what I, like, Joseph brings me things from time to time, he brought me a site in North Strathfield, he brought sites in other areas. Like generally he say, a friend of mine owns this and would you be interested?
Did he ever say things to you of that nature, that he some connection with a person in Station Precinct?

Chidiac had connections with in the Station Precinct?

KINSELLA: Which person?

Like is there someone that Joseph...

KINSELLA: It was more through the connection, like, after they didn't get any success you wouldn't pay them, so in a sense it's a bit like as a buyer's agent or seller's agent, if you give a property to an agent and he doesn't make a sale, you don't pay him commission, it's the same thing when someone is trying to get a site for you. So, what...



Did you pay Joseph Chidiac to so some work for you in the Station Precinct area?

10 KINSELLA: He was paid when he managed to get an outcome, and the outcome in one case was, we were having a lot of problems in getting an anchoring on the sites beside us on the west. We had two very difficult neighbours, the other neighbours were good. (Unintellgible)

On that point who were you talking about at this stage?

KINSELLA: 15 We were talking about Alice in Wonderland and we are talking about I-Prosperity.

Okay.

- KINSELLA: Alice in Wonderland is the lady who owns 16 Walker Street and the other one was I-Prosperity that had the land about three thousand square meters here. In order to build a car park that went down eight levels, so we had to drill, put pylons in and then you put anchors in to hold the pylons in, because the rock condition there, normally sandstone the layers go like this, but there is a lot of shale and the layers go like this.
 - Right.
- 25 So, when the layers go like this there's always risk of slippage into the hole. It's KINSELLA: actually quite dangerous for people working in the hole with the slippage. So, we had to anchor back in pull everything in so (unintelligible)
 - And you would encroach on your neighbour's properties.

So, you're actually anchoring under your neighbour's property. KINSELLA:

Right okay.

KINSELLA: And it's a right that you have under legislation but they also can take you to court and say, listen, say there is another way of doing it that you can prop it, not anchor in. Propping in that depth of hole is totally impractical, but the neighbour, Alice in Wonderland with the seven square meters here, she got her four barristers and solicitors or whatever, and through the court that cost us, we had to pay for all of their cost as well as our own costs. And that went on for probably a year or

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more and delayed the job, I told people waiting for stuff and constructions, so it delayed the job as well as the legal costs. The one on the other side, the I-Prosperity, had a view at the time that they were actually going to stop the project relatively early. So, they thought, well, you guys, if you had anchors underneath our block and the timing doesn't suit us, say you get stopped and you're only half way's up the car park, then we've got a real problem in excavating our land. So, even though that certainly that wasn't our intention, and we had the funding for the whole project anyway, but it took a long time to try and get them round and so we didn't end up with the same problem as the other side and spend two years in court, so we asked Chidiac to see if he could help because we knew he had some relationship with I-Prosperity.

So, what's that knowledge that you have that he had some type of relationship with I-Prosperity?

KINSELLA: I know through the grapevine that he had helped them get some of their land, some of the blocks of land, I think there was about seven blocks of land there.That's Mary and Marquet Street?

KINSELLA: That's right, so we know I helped them negotiate some of those purchases.

And do you know what he did to help I-Prosperity to get that land?


KINSELLA: He probably negotiated with the vendors because there was two Polish blokes that had options or ownership or that sort of thing, I think and and (sic)

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Do you know who owned those sites?

10 KINSELLA: I think it was an old woman on one of them, I think on the corner of Marquet and Mary Street, because we didn't have any interest there, the prices had gone sky high and the planning was uncertain because of overshadowing of the Union Square, it was always an issue. As you know, we are putting a heliostat on our building to get the sun, to shine for, a better word, on Union Square so it had already been overshadowed by Lang Walker's building, so we actually correct some of the issues, even old issues, by putting the sun onto the square.
Cokay, so there's a point in time when you have engaged Joseph Chidiac to do some work for you.

KINSELLA: Yep.

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And I just wanted to cut this a bit short, but it was to assist you in getting anchoring under the I-Prosperity site?

KINSELLA: That's right.

Okay, do you know how –

So, what we, obviously we try to negotiate, we tried to get a, through legal and then you do whatever, where you can do, like, he did help in my view to persuade them that it wasn't a detriment to allow us to do that. Like, we had to pay the normal fees, which we did do for permission to anchor under their land and there's a (unintelligible) specific one that the court would award for that type of thing.

> So, could I explore how that arrangement began with Joseph Chidiac. Did he approach you and say I can help you or did you approach him or was there some intermediatory person saying, we could help you out?

KINSELLA: Obviously, it would have came through an introduction and that may have been Andrew Ferguson's introduction, so then he probably, again I'm not a hundred percent sure, he probably introduced me to the Prolet people and we look and see what they had and what, where we were going so we more or less wanted to know the point of me buying that in the middle of your area.

No, I was focusing on, sorry I may have not been clear enough, I want to explore the engagement of Chidiac to do the work with I-Prosperity. How did that develop. Did he approach you or did you go to him?

30		Chidiac and Associates have sent you an invoice for business referral to
		Llewellyn Street Rhodes.

	:	Is that something that you engaged Mr Chidiac to do something for you at that address?
35	KINSELLA:	That would have been the case, I would have to go through the files with people
		in accounts to see what one this exactly is, but 2 Llewellyn Street was down close
		58

(unintelligible) Prolet had their land. So, we ended up doing a deal with Prolet where we purchased their sites on the northern side of Llewellyn Street. So, we've got all the land expect for one block that's owned by Polish bloke, which we were finding it difficult to get it, down on to Llewellyn Street. And Joseph Jacob then owns from Llewellyn Street south which got just him right up to Ecove's land.

: Do you know who owns number 2?

KINSELLA:

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Right. At the time this tax invoice –

KINSELLA: Number two I'm assuming is on the Northern side of Llewellyn Street, is it?

Who owns it now? I'm assuming that we own it.

Right. So, at the time, this tax invoice is dated February 1 2016 or 1st of February 2016. There's a signature at the bottom of that document, is that your signature, John?

KINSELLA: Yeah, that's actually probably mine, although I usually put a dot over the 'i'. If you look at most of my signatures with that there's a good chance that, yeah, yeah.

Yeah, copy (unintelligible) scan copy of these things.

Okay, so, that's a business referral.

KINSELLA: Yes.

:

It says on the invoice business referral, do you know -

20 KINSELLA: That's right.

- Do you have a recollection of what he did for that payment?

KINSELLA: He would've helped secure that ...

: The option to purchase that property, is that what that's for?

KINSELLA: Yep. He would've secured that. I'm not sure of the exact circumstances of it but he would've helped secure it.

: And the price is a hundred and ten thousand dollars payment.

KINSELLA: That's right. Yeah, the GST plus that. A hundred plus, yeah, that's right.

: Yeah, a hundred thousand plus GST.

KINSELLA: That's right.

In reviewing that document now, is that something that you find reasonable for –

KINSELLA: Yeah, of course.

- the potential –

KINSELLA: Yeah, sorry, what's the -

- development opportunity or purchase opportunity for that address?

35 KINSELLA: Yep. Say this sold for, I have no idea, but I'm sure it's somewhere between one or two million, I think this is quite a small block from memory, so...

Is that something you have a recollection of speaking to Joseph about? KINSELLA: No, to be honest, at this time 2015, we were turning over 1.5 billion a year. The amount of invoices that comes and goes, and people in the office are looking after them because we were in the middle of a big project in Brisbane at the same time, 5 we were in the middle of the southern Wentworth Point at the same time. We were trying to get things going in Camelia at the same time, so every transaction of a hundred thousand or fifty thousand or even a million dollars I don't recollect them because -No, that's okay. KINSELLA: - there are so many transactions. 10 Alright. KINSELLA: As you know, each project - at one stage we had presales of almost three billion dollars. So, for such a small one like this, like, really in a sense what Joseph was trying to secure sites, and in a sense even the deal that we done with Prolet. First 15 of all, not to stand on each other toes so we could secure a block of land. Yep. And then him ultimately selling to us in Llewellyn/Blaxland Concord Road, kind KINSELLA: of all eventuates from the same place. Right. : 20 KINSELLA: Like, we've had a lot of, I suppose, failures in terms of planning. Yep, okay, so -• KINSELLA: Which hasn't helped us in the whole thing. So, I think from what I understand of your testimony so far is that, Joseph Chidiac is a man on the ground, has substantial connections in this area. 25 KINSELLA: Yep. You were introduced to him initially by Andrew Ferguson, to the best of your : recollection. KINSELLA: Yep. And your used Joseph from time to time to help out with problems, effectively, to : 30 KINSELLA: That's right, yeah. Like, this is actually quite small I would say, in the figures here compared to most... Alright, okay. KINSELLA: Purchasing. 35 And just to clarify, you have an understanding that Joseph Chidiac and the Jacob :

brothers have a pre-existing relationship?

	KINSELLA:	I believe so.
	:	Okay.
	KINSELLA:	For how long I have no idea.
	:	Alright.
5	KINSELLA:	But he would've introduced me to them and maybe it was only through there,
		through the land there that they got introduced.
	:	Right.
	KINSELLA:	And again, Andrew Ferguson was probably the one. Andrew Ferguson is kind of
		an introducer, that's probably how he
10	:	An introducer, oh okay.
	KINSELLA:	Yeah, that helps him with his business, because what he is, he sells insurance for
		Coverforce and his job is to drum up new business.
	:	Alright.
	KINSELLA:	So, when you drumming up new business, it's all about the connections. Like, the
15		first thing you start to do when working with builders
	:	Right.
	KINSELLA:	Developers
	:	Right.
	KINSELLA:	Then you hire Chinese staff to try to get into, like, retail and whatever with the
20		Chinese to get them, so, I believe he's built up a lot of business for Coverforce.
	:	Do you know the Mayor of Canada Bay, Angelo Tsirekas?
	KINSELLA:	Yep, yep.
	:	Okay. When did you first meet Angelo?
	KINSELLA:	Again, we probably would've met him from when we bought in Rhodes first, like
25		those early stage in Rhodes.
	:	Ten odd years ago?
	KINSELLA:	Ten, twelve years, something like that.
	:	Ten, twelve years ago. Do you recall the circumstances in which you first met
		Angelo?
30	KINSELLA:	Oh, good God, probably not, no, it's a long time. Probably, it's probably on the -
		once you get newsletters coming out from them, we probably would have put in
		DAs for that first site. And we probably met him in the council chambers, like
		when we were seeking, say - and in the old days, the Councillors generally used
		vote on DAs and whatever, now it goes to panels, most of that stuff is on, like, the
35		council staff makes recommendations, it goes to IHAP and other different kinds
		of panels and those panels make decisions.



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So...

KINSELLA: There is, I don't think the IHAPs and whatever were there in the early days, I think it was actually voted on by the Councillors.

Right, okay.

5 KINSELLA: But generally, the Mayor, I don't recall the Mayor ever voting on any of our stuff. Because the Mayor only voted when there was a locked situation anyway, so I never recall him voting.

How would you describe your relationship over these years with Angelo?

KINSELLA: I would say Angelo is tough, he's a socialist, the whole family, because I've been told his father was quite a socialist. So, like, you have to get on with everybody and naturally why would you pick a fight with anybody, we brought a lot of stuff to the council to show the benefits of infrastructure and to do community things like providing parks and all that kind of thing.

Right.

KINSELLA: So, we would've had a cordial, generally, relationship in terms of we would put things to them, sometimes they'd lead you down the garden path, and it's happened at Canada Bay Council. Like, right at the moment, I would say they are one of the more difficult councils in Sydney.

Right, so in the last ten or twelve years, have you had the opportunity to have social events with Angelo and?

KINSELLA: Yeah, yeah. Like, we do a lot of work overseas and we invite, like we've had ministers, we've had councillors, we've had mayors, we've had people in all areas of business, we run functions. Like, we've been working up at Cambodia about fifteen years. We've been working with (unintelligible). In Cambodia we formed an orphanage, we had a couple thousand kids there. Now we build houses for the poor people up there, we run schools, we run kindergartens, we run health centres, we've got mother and baby HIV transmission programmes, so we've got all those things running up there.

Right.

30 KINSELLA:

: So that's the Billbergia side of charity things, what about your – KINSELLA: So that's the charity thing that we do, yeah. We invite them, the

A: So that's the charity thing that we do, yeah. We invite them, the people from, however (unintelligible), because when we invite, (unintelligible) Lebanese developers and contractors and suppliers in order to help fundraising for these things we do. So, it's always good to have a few people from whatever level of

thing. We also fund an operation (unintelligible) Sisters of Good Shepard.

We've got operations we run in the Philippines, where cleft palate and that type of

government, whether it's federal government or state government or local government, to come because people feel more important, I suppose, when you've got that, so he's come to several functions.

- Are they the charity functions?
- 5 KINSELLA: The charity functions.
 - : Have you invited him to more intimate social functions with yourself or others?
 - KINSELLA: We've been to, we've been out for a couple of dinners. He actually invited me to some dinners, again for his, what do you call it? Networking. For instance, at local Concord Hospital, he asked us if he would sponsor some events with the local hospital, Concord Hospital, which we did do, we sponsored some, there's a lady there called **Exercise**.
 - : Yep.
 - KINSELLA:

A: Which we went to a dinner with, which the Mayor invited, only invited that was a fun introduction but it was really to get some help for the hospital.

Right.

KINSELLA: In terms of, that kind of thing.

Did you, did Angelo ask you for assistance in any other charities? Or...

- KINSELLA: Like, (unintelligible) for assistance, they, we went to the polo club function several years.
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The water polo club.

KINSELLA: The water polo club and we do sponsor that only on a small level, only five thousand dollars I think, something of that nature.

Did Angelo ask you for that?

- 25 KINSELLA: No, I think he would've asked us to go to the function and I think it was some of the others guys that was there actually asked us would we sponsor.
 - : Right, and when you say the other guys, they were?
 - KINSELLA: In the water polo club, I can't think of his name, but he works for the second in Rhodes, he's actually, his son committed suicide a few years ago, I can't think of his name, I'm terrible with names.

Right.


KINSELLA: But he's the one that would've asked us for the sponsorship and that. Again, we were asked, would we be interested in sponsoring the Tiger Leagues Club, which we haven't sponsored them yet, but we've been asked several times, would we be interested (unintelligible)

		which I've been there, not the midnight, the twilight, when they open, so I've

	KINSELLA:	And he is generally there as well.
	:	Right.
	KINSELLA:	If he's not up in Kokoda, up in New Guinea, he would be there.
15	:	Right, just stepping back a moment, we were talking about social functions and
		interactions you've had with Angelo, and you've said you've had a couple of
		dinners. Do you recall when and where that may have taken place?
	KINSELLA:	Oh shit. From memory, there was one I can remember in, I think in Darling
		Harbour. I don't remember the time frame, but I know there was one there, but I
20		can't remember discussions and whatever it was (unintelligible)
	:	Well, let's focus on that dinner at Darling Harbour.
	KINSELLA:	Yeah.
	:	Do you have any rough estimate of time at all when that may have taken place?
	KINSELLA:	Probably would've been, it would've been the last three years, for sure.
25	:	Within the last three years.
	KINSELLA:	Because from memory, and it's only from memory, I think he was back in the
		council when, because he wasn't in the council for a couple of years.
	:	I understand from '16 to '17 from June '16 to September '17, he was running for,
		or he wasn't in council.
30	KINSELLA:	That's right.
	:	He was running for the Federal seat of Reid. Does that recollect with your
		memory?
	KINSELLA:	
25	:	Okay. So subsequent – so, after September '17 there was a dinner with yourself at
35		Darling Harbour.
	KINSELLA	Yeah, that's right.

KINSELLA: Yeah, that's right.



KINSELLA: To be honest I can't recollect what it was, again, and this is a probably or maybe, it's probably him looking at some fundraising for some of his favourite charities. Or it may have been us wanting to put something to him because we were asked by the council about, a number of years ago, it must've been in the old General Manager's time, to look at black water treatment.



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KINSELLA: Gary Sawyer, that's right. And we actually, we put a lot of, we put nearly two million dollars into this to put a black water treatment programme together for

Is that Gary Sawyer you're talking about?

them, for the council.

So, is this something you recollect talking to him about at the dinner?

KINSELLA: I would've spoke to him about that at dinner, because how that happened is we put the whole thing together.

Right.

- 15 KINSELLA: We thought it was a goer, we were putting a huge tank in Marquet Street to handle this because at the time I think we were in a little bit of drought, and recycled water was one of the big things, and the council said they wanted to do recycled water at Rhodes. So, we went to negotiate with two groups, Pro Systems and Viola(?), and design the whole system to care for the whole area. 20
 - Right.
 - KINSELLA: And then we were only told by the council, when we had it all together and contract's almost signed, that another community wouldn't see much benefit in that. Like, on some things they didn't, they really push you off, right? So, there was a bit of a hurdle for you over this treatment.
- 25 KINSELLA: Yeah, because we thought it was actually, especially when we were asked to look at it –

Right.



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- and put something together, we thought that, we had the shits a little bit about it. Right.

30 KINSELLA:

Then we looked at putting some other planning proposals to council, generally for infrastructure type of things. Again, at this stage it became clear that, the guys will say that Councillors, even probably the top staff wasn't running the planning, it was the more junior guys seemed to be running the planning, as against the, you know, the higher bureaucrats, or the political people.



Right. So, do you have a recollection of speaking to Angelo about your problems at this dinner?

	KINSELLA:	I would have because I always take the opportunity to talk about problems with
		council, which I always had.
	:	Right okay.
	KINSELLA:	So, I mean it would've happened as a matter of course.
5	:	Do you have any recollection of what Angelo said to you in response to your
		issues you raised with him?
	KINSELLA:	Angelo would always say, "talk to staff".
	:	Right.
	KINSELLA:	That was, it wouldn't cover all of that, Angelo would always do, is talk to staff.
10	:	Right.
	KINSELLA:	So he would always send you back down the road. So, you really wouldn't get
		anywhere with Angelo, even if you put something good in front of him, talk to
		staff.
	:	Right.
15	KINSELLA:	You put something that, you could put an all new rail line, talk to staff.
	:	So, what was the purpose of the dinner in the first place though?
	KINSELLA:	Sometimes you wonder with dinners, like I honestly don't know what was the
		purpose of dinner. I suppose you people
	:	I mean, it's –
20	KINSELLA:	You people network, I suppose they do. I can't really recall if it had a specific
		purpose, but I would suspect it didn't have any outcome anyway if it had a
		purpose.
	:	What, who else was present at this dinner?
	KINSELLA:	I don't know but Chidiac may have been there. Chidiac may have been
25	:	So, if there's no specific purpose for the dinner and you get the general response
		from Angelo to go and seek council's opinion
	KINSELLA:	That's right.
	:	I'm trying to understand why even bother in the first place?
	KINSELLA:	How many dinners have you gone to that really didn't have much purpose or
30		outcome? I'm sure a few.
	:	Well, I'm asking you, I don't know.
	KINSELLA:	(Laughs) That's right, that's what I'm saying.
	:	You're the developer in the area having a dinner with the Mayor of council, but
		you're telling me on one hand there's really no purpose in the dinner when he's
35		not going to help you or do anything.

KINSELLA: No, what, I honestly don't even know if it was the Mayor at the time. But listen, if someone asked you to go out for dinner or whatever you don't say, no piss off, you don't do that. Like, if anyone of our subcontractors asked me, he's doing the painting, come out to dinner on Wednesday night, I'll go out for dinner on Wednesday night, because you don't want to insult or upset anybody.

: Okay.

KINSELLA: It's all, everything is, relationships are important.

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Alright, and if the relationships are important, this opportunity to have dinner was a good, you agree with me or disagree with me, I'm just, was a good opportunity to foster those relationships, especially with the Mayor?

KINSELLA:Well, I'll put it this way. It's certainly better than the alternative of saying no.:Right.

KINSELLA: And I don't even know who would have invited, like was it the Mayor invited? I don't know.

: Right.

KINSELLA: It may or may not have been.

: Do you have a recollection of Chidiac having some involvement in this discussion?

KINSELLA: In the discussion about what?

- : About the issues you had at the Station Precinct or East Rhodes and in the Rhodes Precinct generally.
- KINSELLA: Did he have any discussion with the Mayor, probably not. I never, I can never recall him acting on our behalf to do anything, because the discussion was always either with him or the Mayor, talk to staff. And which we did, they may have arranged, Angelo may have arranged a meeting to talk to **may for talk** to this one, or that one or talk to Tony McNamara at the time. That's, you were always sent on a goose chase.

Right.



So, you always went back to here and then, like, everything's came up to council, they went to Councillors, there were reports on it, they did a report on it or whatever, and we haven't had that many successes, but we've had a few. So, do you have a recollect of Chidiac trying to facilitate something with Angelo Tsirekas in relation to your developments or proposals in the area?

KINSELLA: No, to be honest, he was more picking up sites. The expectation when you're going into an area like Rhodes East, being a priority precinct on a railway station on the main road, with all the services there, that you should get a reasonable

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density. And by the way, it was the state government that was looking after that. The council, I don't even really know even today how much involvement of the council, the government tells me they're doing it. I do know they were meeting with council once a month, outcomes of any of that, I have no idea.

5	:	Who picked up the tab for that particular dinner?
	KINSELLA:	Don't know.
	:	Were there, sorry.
	:	No, I was just going to say, so Angelo –
	KINSELLA:	I'm assuming, again I'm assuming. I didn't pick it up, so I'm assuming that
10		would've have been picked up by the Mayor. That's what I'm assuming.
	:	Why do you assume that?
	KINSELLA:	Because I didn't pick it up.
	:	Why do you know that?
	KINSELLA:	I didn't pick it up.
15	:	You have a clear recollection of that?
	KINSELLA:	I have a clear recollection that I didn't pick it up.
	:	Alright.
	KINSELLA:	And the same way when you go, even have a cup of tea with any government
		body or political people, even a cup of tea, they won't take it.
20	:	Have you had, apart from this dinner with Angelo, had opportunities to meet him
		in other restaurants or cafes?
	KINSELLA:	(Unintelligible)
	:	Any other social events?
	KINSELLA:	Yeah, yeah.
25	:	I'm excluding official council functions like Mayoral Christmas functions and
		that sort of thing.
	KINSELLA:	Oh yeah, I got, I was at last year's Mayoral function, I wasn't at the year before, I
		was at the two (unintelligible) ones before.
	:	Yeah, I'm excluding those, that's fine. I'm just talking about more
30	KINSELLA:	Then I was at the one they have for awards, which was held in the Phoenix
		restaurant in Rhodes. I've been at a few of them with the council, they hand out
		awards to different groups.
	:	But I'm more focusing on you, Angelo and a small group of people, not an
		official type setting more like let's go and have dinner let's go and have a sup of

official type setting, more like, let's go and have dinner, let's go and have a cup of coffee, let's just meet.

KINSELLA: We were, probably a couple of us were, like I don't remember where with the Tigers, some people from the Tigers Club. I think, I'm not sure, the CEO or whatever (unintelligible) but the bloke (unintelligible) that were the Tigers, he was actually Australian Rules before. 5 Right. KINSELLA: So, we were at some function with him, again I think it was part of the process of seeing if they could get us involved in sponsorship of the Tigers League Club. Just a quick question about -KINSELLA: I think there may have been actually a couple of functions, we were even at the 10 big, big function at Darling Harbour long time ago. John, I just want to ask you a couple of questions about Angelo and Joseph. KINSELLA: Yeah. They are obviously known to each other. : KINSELLA: Yeah, absolutely, and I think it's obviously through the Labor Party. 15 Yeah, so -: KINSELLA: And again, Andrew Ferguson is part of the same Labor Party, I'm not sure they're all in the same branch but, like, I've heard through the grapevine again that those guys don't get on as well anymore even though the two of them are sitting on council. 20 Okay. KINSELLA: From what I can gather, they are not the best of friends anymore, but they were good friends. I was actually at Angelo's father's funeral, back I'm not sure, a number of years ago now, not that many years, about three four years, something of that nature. 25 So, it would have been obvious if you are sat at the table with Joseph and Angelo, that everyone knew who everyone was, it was obviously pre-existing relationships, yeah. KINSELLA: I mean people are in the area a long time, we were in the area a long time. Yeah, so Angelo knew you, knew what you did, he knows Joseph, he knew well. 30 KINSELLA: Of course, of course. And I assume he knew that there was a relationship between yourself and Joseph ÷ that involved securing sites and helping out with various... KINSELLA: I don't know whether he knew or not... That would've been no secret, I assume.

- KINSELLA: I suppose it wasn't a secret, in a sense. But did he, do I know for certain that he knew that Joseph was working for me, I don't know. Like, Joseph (unintelligible) I'm working for John, I'm picking up sites, I never recall him saying that.
 - : No. But I assume it might have been a bit awkward otherwise because Angelo might've wondered why Joseph was there?
- KINSELLA: I don't know, I'm assuming that those guys were probably mates, like if they are in the Labor Party together. And, again, I'm only assuming are they in the same faction, are they in the same, what do you call it, ward or whatever (unintelligible), branch, that was the case I'm assuming that they know each other pretty well.
 - And that assumption rolls over into assuming that Angelo, and there was no secret that Chidiac was working for you around that time. Not on a sort of pay as you go basis but on a sort of -

KINSELLA: Well, he certainly wasn't a P-A-Y-E, that's for sure.

Yeah.

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- KINSELLA: And like, I'm assuming, and again, it was the assumption that Chidiac was working for other people within Sydney because I don't think he would've made enough money for me to actually survive, because you can see he hasn't got many cheques in a period of so many years, so I'm assuming he was helping other people in other areas. But again, that's an assumption that I don't really know.
 So, apart from, and I just wanted to touch again back on my question, Mr Kinsella, about your social interactions with Angelo Tsirekas, and you've told us about one. Do you have any recollections about others?
 - KINSELLA: I've told you about several.

: Several.

KINSELLA: No, I've told you about several, I've told you that in the Phoenix restaurant, I've told you in Darling Harbour, I've told you in Angelo's on, where we had the Christmas parties, I've told you that we actually had one with the lady up in the hospital. So, I've told you about several.

: Okay, and has those social event, s have they included Joseph Chidiac as well?

KINSELLA: Does he go to the Christmas party; I can recall seeing him at one or two of the council Christmas parties. Is he a fixed event there, or does he give speeches, I don't (unintelligible).

Alright, what about Oliveto, have you been there with Angelo Tsirekas before?



ELLA: Yeah, at the Christmas parties, I think we had two Christmas parties there, with the council Christmas parties.

		there. Again, they were, that was an invitation from, I can't think of his name, you
		probably, you probably know the bloke from the Tigers over there, but I was
		invited to that, again I see at that event. I'm not sure that the Mayor was
15		there, I'm not sure. He could have been but I'm not sure that he was.
	:	You're not sure, alright.
	KINSELLA:	He could very well have been there. I remember getting pies and meeting
		that's all. Meat pies, and the tigers lost, but was actually, he said to the
		guys, listen, I'll give them ten thousand dollars a man if they win this match.

		remember that particular one, because was there.





And it's D10736264, and that's a claim for a reimbursement for that amount of money, firstly I will get you to look at the amount of money you say you're claiming, tell me is it thirty eight thousand or is it three hundred and eighty three thousand, not sure if the decimal point is in the right place.

(Unintelligible) it's not paid.

I'm not -.

What's the amount there, is it thirty eight thousand?
